



email on your phone? (Have you tried?) If not, go find your family's Nerd and get that set up. Go ahead; we'll wait...

Bagged that? Cool. Now:

1. Open your PTD's photo-viewing function. (Sometimes this is called a "gallery.")
2. Display the photo you want to email. A small number of icons should appear above, alongside, or below the photo.
3. Tap the icon to share the photo. In most cases these days that will look like an arrow bent in the middle with an arrowhead on each branch (implication being that "starting from here you can send your photo to multiple recipients").
4. The PTD will provide sharing options, including many forms of social media and whatever email package you have connected. Pick that one.
5. Address the email (possibly to yourself, so you can open it on your computer) and click Send.
6. Then go to your computer and open the incoming email as you would any other message.

Once you open the email on your computer, you can download the attached file as you would any attachment and store in whichever directory you like to store photos.

And there you go. For more hints and tips you may want to try searching for instruction specific to your own situation. To do so, open your Internet browser and start by typing in "how do I transfer photos between," then enter your phone and computer model names and specifications.
